





Brian Webb graduated with distinction from the University of Alberta with a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Theatre. He then moved to New York City, working with Eric Hawkins who had an influence on his early dance making. During the 1970's, Brian premiered many of his first dances with the Carol Conway Company in New York.

Returning to Edmonton in 1979, he formed the Brian Webb Dance Company as "company in residence" at Grant MacEwan College, where he was the Chair of the Dance Program for ten years. The company began presenting a dance season in 1991and is now the largest season of contemporary dance west of Toronto. Since the beginning, the BWDC has been dedicated to experimentation, the new, and a collaborative creative process.

His company has commissioned over 30 musical scores, numerous installations by visual artists and scripts by writers. Brian collaborates with local artists and works to give their work a broad context through tours across Canada and abroad. As Artistic Director of the Canada Dance Festival at the National Arts Centre (NAC) in Ottawa from 2001 to 2011, he also introduced much innovative programming.


In 1995, Brian was awarded the Syncrude Award for Innovation in Artistic Direction and in 1998, the Telus Award for Arts of the Future. Brian has been inducted into the Edmonton Cultural Hall of Fame (2002), and received the Queens Jubilee Medal (2002) and the Alberta Centennial Medal (2005). In 2009, Brian was awarded a University of Alberta Alumni Honour Award.

Artist and curator, **Nicole Mion** creates for the stage and screen. She is a sought after director and contemporary choreographer specializing in contemporary performance, new media, dance, and installation. She is Artistic Director for Springboard Performance where she curates the Fluid Movement Arts Festival in Calgary; Interrarium an interdisciplinary creative residency

at the Banff Centre for the Arts; and ContainR, a mobile theatre and public art installation.

Recent works include direction of an animated short film Fight for Flight for Bravo!FACT/CTV featuring International female ski jumper Katie Willis and her fight to jump at the Olympics, Gut Symmetries a dance performance for the stage featuring Jeannie Vanderkerkhove, and ContainR a video installation, live performance venue featuring physicality in winter sports, performance and dance films housed in reconfigured shipping containers for the Vancouver Winter Olympics.

Known for her highly physical and theatrical style, Nicole won the Paula Citron award for most outstanding choreography at fFIDA (Toronto). Her stage work has been seen at OYR's High Performance Rodeo, Seattle's On The Boards Festival, Vancouver's Dancing on the Edge Festival, Alberta Scene at the National Arts Centre (Ottawa), the Banff Centre Summer Arts Festival, New Dance Horizons (Regina), Dancers Studio West (Calgary), Mile Zero Dance (Edmonton), Brief Encounters (Vancouver), Art Gallery of Calgary, fFIDA Festival (Toronto), choreography representing Canada at the DaCl conferences in Brazil and The Hague, and direction and choreography for the opening ceremonies of the IAAF World Games (Edmonton).

Nicole enjoys creating solos inspired by specifically wonderful and unique individuals. These biographical choreographies include solo work and commissions for Momo Mixed-Ability Dance Theatre, Luciane Pinto, Carol Greyeyes, Andrea Gunnlaugson, and Stephen Thompson.

Nicole has also created over 20 short films as director and choreographer which are broadcast on CTV, Bravo!FACT, the Comedy Network, Knowledge Network, Comedy Central, the Women's Television Network, the Independent Film Channel, and presented in festivals around the world. Recent video work includes That Thing Between Us, a single channel broadcast and 3-channel video installation, and over 40 commercials for Shaw Communications where she choreographed their People Powered National campaign.

James Gnam is a Vancouver based performer, improviser and choreographer. He received his training at the National Ballet School of Canada and in 1998 began working with Les Grands Ballets Canadiens de Montreal. In 2003, he joined Ballet British Columbia where he performed in works by Jiri Kylian, Twyla Tharp, Mark Morris and Lar Lubavitch; and created roles with choreographers Crystal Pite, John Alleyne and Simone Orlando. As a freelance dance artist, James has collaborated with Lee Su-Feh/Battery Opera, Peter Bingham/EDAM Dance as well as Thomas Lehman/SINS. In 2008, James and his wife Natalie LeFebvre Gnam incorporated the plastic orchid factory. Since then, the factory has engaged in creative residencies at the Dance Centre in Vancouver, The Shadbolt Centre for the Arts in Burnaby, Circuit-Est in Montreal and Opera Estate in Bassano Italy; Creating work that has been presented by The Vancouver International Dance Festival, Dancing on the Edge, The Dance Centre, The Chutzpah! Festival, The Vancouver Art Gallery and The New Forms Festival. James has created new works for the Bouand Dance Company in Portland Oregon, The Contingency Plan Dance Collective, EDAM Dance and the School of Contemporary Arts at Simon Fraser University.

Ursa Major, is well known in the prairie sky. Her mythological inheritance lingers on the horizon. soft foot draws from a body of work that began many years ago, including an Ursa character created for Ziyian Kwan in Rouge-gorge's recent group work, in fur till spring.

soft foot, a term coined by prairie movement maverick Amelia Itcush, is a constellation of images and actions in an inter-play of myth and body memory. This work is an ode to Amelia, choreographed by Robin Poitras, commissioned and performed by Ziyian Kwan.

A prolific dance and performance creator Robin Poitras cofounded Regina's New Dance Horizons in 1986, where she
continues to act as Artistic Director. In 2008 she launched a
creation company Rouge-gorge. Robin holds a B.F.A. special
honors degree in dance from York University and has received
many grants and awards including the 2004 Women of
Distinction Award for the Arts and the 2006 Lifetime Achievement
Award at the 2006 Mayor's Awards for Business & The Arts in
Regina. Her works have been presented across Canada, in
Spain, France, Germany and Mexico.

Since 1989, **Ziyian Kwan** has performed in an eclectic range of dance, theatre and film productions. Of note has been work by battery opera, Co.Erasga, David Pressault Danse, Kokoro Dance, Lola Dance, Mascall Dance, parB.L.eux, The Plastic Orchid Factory, Rouge-gorge, Peter Bingham, Jennifer Clarke, Daniel Danis, Susan Elliott and John Ottmann. In the last few years, the technique of Amelia Itcush has been at the core of Ziyian's daily practice. *soft foot* is the first in a series of solos that Ziyian has initiated in response to the lifework of Amelia Itcush. Following this commission of Robin Potiras, Ziyian will dance the neck to fall, her own solo creation that is inspired by Amelia's physical poetry. "In loving memory of Amelia Itcush, who moves my body and touches my heart." ~ Ziyian Kwan.

Jeff Morton (Sound Designer) is a composer and performer currently based in Regina, SK. His music and media art are playful, experimental explorations of sound, sound-making, and compositional processes using found and musical objects and materials. His work includes traditional and graphic notation for instrumental chamber music, DIY audio building and bending, and electroacoustic performance. Jeff has a Masters Degree in Music Composition from the University of Victoria in 2008, and he has performed in festivals, concert halls, and off-site locations around Canada and Europe.

Brent Lott danced for Winnipeg's Contemporary Dancers (WCD) under the direction of Tom Stroud from 1999 to 2004. During this time he was also provided the opportunity to become Tom Stroud's assistant. Brent was appointed the Artistic Director of WCD in June of 2005.

Brent's first full-length work for WCD, STRUCK, was called 'a work of mystery and beauty 'by the Globe and Mail's Paula Citron. His other full length choreographic endeavours include Coming in to Autumn with actor Naomi Cooke, His Banner Over Me with clarinetist Lori Freedman and a co-production with Christina Medina entitled as long as now. Brent's work also includes directing and choreographing Winn Wells' play Gertrude Stein and a Companion, which toured both Canada and England and the video i went by a clean name which premiered at Contemporary Dancers' 35th Anniversary Festival. Brent's choreographic contribution to England's physical theatre company, Foursight Theatre, was recently seen across England in the production of Can Any Mother Help Me?.

Sarah Roche graduated from the Senior Professional Program of the SCD with a B.A. Honours in dance from University of Winnipeg. She began working with WCD in 2006 as an apprentice and this is Sarah's 6th season with the company. She has performed works by a variety of choreographers around Canada and has recently begun choreographing her own short solos for Young Lungs Dance Exchange. In addition to performing Sarah has taught and choreographed in rural Manitoba, at SCD, and in the Winnipeg School Division with Learning Through The Arts.

DAVID FRASER Lighting Designer for the Prairie Dance Circuit

As an Edmonton based artist, David works extensively across the country in dance, theatre, and opera. His theatrical designs have been seen from The National Arts Centre in Ottawa, to The Belfry Theatre in Victoria, and his designs in Dance have been seen both nationally and internationally with Edmonton based Choreographer Tania Alvarado. David has been the resident designer with the Brian Webb Dance Company for the last twelve years, and has also collaborated with Robin Poitras on Built: a Sheltering Mirage in 2008. Most recently David designed the lighting for Death of a Salesman, with The Citadel Theatre, Lucia di Lammermoor, with the Vancouver Opera, and the New York City premier of Any Night at the 14th Street Y Theatre. He has been nominated for a Jessie Richardson Award, A Betty Mitchell Award, and ten Elizabeth Sterling Haynes Awards, and he has been the recipient once for his lighting design.



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

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










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
